PREMIERE: The Time Machine – A Victorian Magic Lantern Show

#### PREMIERE: The Astounding Insect Circus Museum!

This internationally renowned company are based just outside Bury St Edmunds yet incredibly have never performed in their hometown! We are addressing this omission right now!

#### **EVENT PROGRAMME**

- Spectacular participatory events were hosted by principal sites within the town centre, beginning with a Magic Lantern show at Moyse's Hall Museum. This was the only ticketed event as it was a Friends event to support the Museum. Everything else on the night was free!
- A Children's Lantern Parade led from outside the Apex through the town to the Abbey Gardens accompanied by the Framtastics Gymnastics Club (Norwich), local Fireflow Circus street performers and local band Thy Last Drop playing acoustically to lead the Parade.
- The children carried lanterns made at special free family workshops held at the Library in the previous week, all culminating at the Abbey Gardens, where visitors enjoyed performances by the various entertainers, as well as the Insect Circus Museum, which was also open the following day for free.









#### **EVENT PROGRAMME**

- Events elsewhere included "St Johns Street and Beyond: Lightshow Trail" in shop windows.
- These lightshows consisted of a digital projector + laptop positioned in each shop, projecting out onto the street through the shop window which had a paper screen set up. We had volunteers from West Suffolk College to operate and monitor these.
- We focused this Lightshow Trail predominately on St John's Street area + another couple of areas
- The lightshows are a mix of looped powerpoint slideshows and videos featuring work by West Suffolk College students, local artists/makers, groups and charities. It is also a great opportunity for local businesses to promote their work as well.

#### **EVENT PROGRAMME**

- A local band's Album Launch party at Vinyl Hunter + Hoo Ha Club with Sketch Lounge DJ session at the Con Club.
- There was also a "Busk At Dusk" event at specific busking points in the centre of Bury St Edmunds that evening inviting local musicians to take part acoustically. There are special 'Busk At Dusk' banners to mark these points sponsored by local business Save Money Cut Carbon.

A free photographic "Painting With Light" workshop by local business Pixel8, linked to Jessops in the town. This was bookable in advance and took place in Abbey Gardens.

#### LOCAL BENEFITS

- We drew together audiences of different ages and abilities through the diversity and universality of the proposed events and aimed to showcase the work of local artists and students of West Suffolk College.
- Economically, the event aims to provide employment for the artists and performers and stimulate town-centre trade, both directly (traders involved) and indirectly (traders open).
- It is also there to encourage visitors and boost the night time economy of the town. Revenues generated explicitly from the event (where applicable, mainly donations) will be donated to the charity Suffolk Mind.
- ➤ It is also hoped that the Festival will enhance partnership opportunities amongst the town's principal tourist sites.



#### **OUTCOMES**

- The White Nights Festival will develop intergenerational relationships within the community and build a framework for sustainable partnerships between the education, arts, culture, and business sectors for the whole community to partake in.
- We are planning for this to become a regular annual Autumn Festival generating business and visitor interest for the town as well as contributing to the wellbeing of its residents.
- The overall theme is of 'Light' which already opens up so much development and interpretation, but also each year is planned to have a topical theme to it to inspire participants.
- It will enable senior citizens and young people (including those with disabilities and special educational needs) to engage in inclusive community events and workshops and will contribute towards the mental well-being of local residents through arts activities and celebratory events.





- Evaluation will be achieved through registers of workshop and event attendees, schools and community participation, and press coverage.
- Sustainability will be demonstrated through the partnerships created between the Local Authority, arts, culture, education, commerce and the lasting impact of new relationships and connections within the community.

#### PRESS - LANTERN WORKSHOPS



Workshops were held for children on Saturday to make lanterns in preparation for the Festival of Light extravaganza.

The workshops which were organised during the morning and afternoon, were held at Bury St Edmunds library.

Stella Keen, one of the directors for the 'White Night Festival of Light', said: "It seemed to go really well, we got good feedback."

The afternoon workshop saw 25-30 adults and 25-30 children attend.

Children's lantern parade, fireflow circus performers

#### A festival celebrating the autumn equinox burst into Bury St Edmunds on Friday in a ray of white light.

White Night: The Festival of Light, organised by the Arbon Arts Centre saw a variety of events storm into the town, including an insect museum, lantern parade and magic lantern show.

Alex McWhirter, one of the directors of the event, said: "It went very well, considering it was the first time, it was very well received and well attended.

"The inside circus saw 400 visitors."

The festival included, a lantern parade which saw gymnasts come all the way from Norwich, as well as children who had attended previous workshops to make the lanterns which were showcased from the arctothe Abbey Gardens.

The town saw circus performers parade through the streets and the procession was met with an insect circus museum who originally come from Great Livermere but was their first time performing in Bury.

Mr McWhirter said: "People seemed to be very impressed."

Much of the funding for the festival – which is planned to become an annual eventcame from locality budgets and sponsors, including St Edmundsbury and Forest Heath councils, MENTA and West Suffolk College.






